Preface

Michael Madhusudan Memorial College is located at Durgapur City Centre in Burdwan District of West Bengal and registered under 2(f) and 12(B) of the UGC Act is submitting the Self Study Report (SSR) for Assessment and Accreditation in the **Second Cycle**. The College was started its journey from 1996 and it became affiliated to Burdwan University from beginning, i.e. August 1996. At present the college is in a state of transition as regards its status of affiliation. The college has been affiliated to the KaziNazrul University, Asansol from 23rd June, 2015. Now, a few words regarding introduction of the college should be stated to explore its status.

In the steel city, Durgapur it is second co-educational general degree college was establish to address the growing need to accommodate huge number of students of the locality and offer higher education opportunity in Durgapur Subdivision of Burdwan University. Individuals from different fold of the society-people representatives, social workers, educationists, politicians, businessmen and after all local people had the strong intension that such an institution was essential to fulfil the dreams of aspirants and develop useful human resources for local and global need. In this respect, at very beginning the college was started with three teaching staff and three non-teaching staff under supervision of Principal, Women's College, Durgapur as Principal-in-charge of this College in Vidyasagar Primary school campus, City Centre, Durgapur. The same year 15 acre land was donated to the college by AsansoDurgapur Development Authority (ADDA) to establish its own campus at Kabi Guru Sarani near City Centre, Durgapur. Presently college is running in two stored building and another annex academic block construction is already started.

The first milestone of the college was the introduction of Honours in English and Geography in 2000. The second milestone was the introduction of professional courses in B.B.A (H) and B.C.A. (H). Later on courses in Science stream was opened in Computer Science (H), Physics (H), Microbiology (H), Mathematics (H), Zoology (G), Chemistry (G) etc. At present the college runs successfully 20 departments out of which 13 courses are having Honours (English, Bengali, Geography, History, Philosophy, Education, Physics, Mathematics, Computer Science, Microbiology, Accountancy), including two (02) Professional courses on B.B.A. (H) and B.C.A. (H) and seven (07) General courses on Political Science, Economics, Hindi, Sanskrit, Music, Chemistry, Zoology etc.

The main objective of the college is not only to impart knowledge but to inculcate in them - wisdom, compassion and humanitarian spirit along with quality education. We have multicultural student population; hence we shouldteach them the importance of tolerance and respecting each other's culture. Also, discipline, integrity, value-education are the very foundation of an institute which are our utmost priority.

The focus of the College is upon professional courses. The introduction of Bachelor in Business Administration (BBA) Bachelor in Computer Application (BCA) self-financevocational courses, Information Technology etc. is the step taken towards equipping the students with the necessary aptitude, competence and professional skill. There is ample opportunity to the students of the locality to avail general degrees from the institution at the same time they may develop their professional skill, aptitude, self-confidence to explore themselves in the global competitive world. Several training courses, workshops, seminars are arranged time to time for the benefit of the students to expose them for job opportunity and motivation in higher education. IT professional, management organizations, different companies are coming to the campus for different purposes in terms of student's promotional aspect, employment opportunity, scope of higher studies etc.

The healthy practice of the college is that there are NSS and NCC units actively running with over-all activities throughout the year in terms of Blood donation camp, free health check-up camp, different awareness campaign etc.

The college establishes most notable example of harmonious co-existence amidst the plurality of languages and culture. It has vibrant alumni who are successfully established in different parts of country and abroad. We are enriched by their continuous help and cooperation in various aspects. The Placement Cell of the college successfully caters to the job opportunities for students. Establishment of new academic block for Geography Laboratory, class rooms, Smart class room and Language Lab are added to the existing infrastructure. The college has one canteen, a gymnasium, a well-stocked and equipped Library, besides gender sensitization & grievance Redressal Cell, an Anti-Ragging Cell. A dedicated Bank branch is available in college campus for fees collection and other services related to financial transaction.

An internet link has been developed campus –wide for students, teachers, researchers and staff. The reforms have been introduced in college administrative works like, implementation of COSA, e-Billing, e-Prodhan, as well as in Library documentation (KOHA), online admission, and fees collection through banking system.

The college discourages gender discrimination and is trying to realise the objective of women's empowerment. Different scholarship and free studentship schemes have been introduced for women students and backward classes.

Executive Summary

Michael Madhusudan Memorial College, established in 1996 and affiliated to the University of Burdwan, had a humble beginning with the traditional courses in Arts and Commerce. The Institute always tried to grow in tune with the demand of the society and public. The first milestone of the college was the introduction of Honours in English and Geography in 2000. The second milestone was the introduction of professional courses in B.B.A (H) and B.C.A (H). Later on courses in Science stream was opened in Physics, Microbiology, Mathematics, Zoology, Chemistry. At present the college runs successfully 20 departments of which 11 courses are having Honours (English, Bengali, Geography, History, Philosophy, Education, Physics, Mathematics, Computer Science, Microbiology, Accountancy), 2 professional courses (B.B.A. and B.C.A.) and 7 pass courses (Political Science, Economics, Hindi, Sanskrit, Music, Chemistry, Zoology).

The Institution envisions the kind of College which would become the centre of excellence, with a wide spectrum of subjects catering to the needs of all categories of students.

The College is aware that Teaching- Learning and Evaluation is the most vital criterion Teaching and Non-Teaching staffs are recruited through proper procedures. Number of working and teaching days are mentioned in the Academic Calender. So that the teaching hours are maximized. The Teachers are encouraged to attend different faculty development programmes like Orientation programmes, Refreshers Courses, Workshops and Seminars. The college believes in participatory management and so discussions between the Teachings, Non-Teaching staffs and the Principal are held for overall development of the College. The examination system of the college is basically on the traditional half yearly and annual examinations. Apart from this, regular class tests and interactive sessions are taken.

The activity of the Institute is not only confined to teaching and learning, but also there has been a lot of enthusiasm among the Faculties regarding research work. 14 Teachers are pursuing individual research for Ph.D, 4 Faculties have been awarded Ph.D degree within last 4 years, 3 Faculties are engaged in UGC funded Minor Research

Project, 3 Faculties have applied for the same and one Faculty have completed a minor research project.

The Institution has the necessary infrastructure, with spacious classrooms, laboratories, library, auditorium and gymnasium. But with the increase in the number of students and courses, the infrastructure was found not adequate enough. Hence the College Authority planned to construct extra classrooms. 4 Classrooms with an area of 2400 sq.ft. were constructed to cope up with the inadequacy. The College has a branch of Central Bank of India. The College canteen caters to the need of the students and staff. The laboratories of Geography, Physics, and Computer Science have been upgraded.

A green generator is installed for uninterrupted power supply. The college has Wi-fi facility and internet connections in the Office, Staffroom, Library and lab based Departments. CCTV cameras has been installed in nodal positions within the College to maintain law and order. A smart room and English language lab is on the make.

The College takes necessary actions regarding students' support and progression. Financial assistance in the form of fee waiver is extended to the students belonging to the BPL category. Students are made aware regarding Government Scholarships for SC, ST, Minority category and also of for girl students (Kanyashree). Students are encouraged to participate in Annual sports and cultural programs organized by Students' Council.

The vision of the College is to prepare students who would understand and implement the value of education.

The mission is to nourish and nurture the spirit of secularism and promote the sense of national integration.

The Governing Body of the College and the Principal gives emphasis on quality education, formulate strategic plans and actions.

Separate sub-committees are formed with various responsibilities, to look into the concerned area and for overall development. Formal feedback is taken from the outgoing batch and based on the feedback (informally) from other stake holders, necessary corrective measures are taken.

So far as the financial conditions is concerned, the College stands on a strong footing. The sources of finance are students' tuition fees, grants from State Government

and UGC. Income and expenditure are closely monitored by the Bursar, Head Clerk and the Accountant headed by the Principal.

The Best practices followed by the Institution are

- 1) Recruitment of Guest lecturers to help the students to cope up with the syllabus, where there is lack of adequate faculties.
- 2). Decentralized Management where the participatory concept of management is applied. All decisions are finalized after proper discussions with the different Statuary and Non Statutory bodies.

To put in a nutshell, Michael Madhusudan Memorial College has achieved much within one and a half decade but much remains to be done.

The College believes in producing quality students who are fired with zeal and endowed with the quality of head and heart, and who would become ideal citizens, free from provincialism, regionalism. Such students would be pride and an asset to the country.



<u>B.B.A (H)</u> – It's a 3 year degree honours course <u>Part-I</u>, there is an examination of 700 marks having 7 subjects of 100 marks each. (80 written exam & 20 internal). Part-II– it is as same as Part-I.

<u>Part-III</u> – Comprises of 800 marks. 600 marks in 6 papers of 100 marks each (80 written and 20 internal). 100 marks for Industrial Project and 100 marks for Grand Viva.

<u>B.C.A (H)</u> – It is a three years honours degree course each year i.e. Part-I, Part-II and Part-III each havings 900 marks (600 Theory and 300 Practical).

In written paper 80 marks is allowed to written test and 20 marks for internal assessment.

Fee Structure -

B.B.A (H) - 23000/- per annum

B.C.A (H) - 28000 /- per annum.

Salary -

- As none of the other colleges in the sub-division offers courses in Geography. This subject was introduced in the year to meet the high demand.

The top most priority of the College is to ensure admission for all deserving candidates. The College announces its admission in the College website and updates information from time to time.

The College puts up banners and posters in its main gate, bus stops and other strategic points.

To ensure transparency, the College admission process is done purely on merit basis adhering to the rule of reservation which is prescribed by Higher Education Dept., Government of West Bengal.

The admission Committee members after a through scrutinyconducts the admission process by counseling.

Before 2013-14 academic session, the College followed separate admission procedures for Honours and General Pass Courses. For Honours subject a merit list was prepared for each subject and a day was announced for different subjects for counseling. Students gathered and were admitted on merit basis.

For general B.A., B.Sc. and B.Com a date was announced for admission where admission was conducted also on merit basis.

In the session 2013-14 the University undertook the overall responsibility of admission of Honours Courses through Centralized Online process.

In the current academic session, the College has started online admission process for both Honours and General Courses absolutely on academic merit basis.

• Minimum percentage of marks for admission to honours course is 45 % in aggregate and also 45 % in the subject opted for honours.

Merit list is prepared according to the index no.

- Index number is prepared taking to in account the marks of the best 5 subjects and the score in the subject opted for honours courses.
- For general courses pass marks in the H.S. or equivalent exam is the minimum criteria for admission. However admission is taken on merit basis.


2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

- The institution tries to extend all possible help and support to the differently abled students by
 - Allotting Examination seats in Ground Floor.
 - Library facility available in Ground Floor.
 - Students unable to write with their own hands are provided with amanuensis to help them write their exam. This, of course required the permission of the University.
 - The assistant must be under qualified.
 - Extra time is also provided to the physical disabled student during examination.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

- The criteria for admission in totally on merit basis in all programmes.
- During admission the students are counselled to help them to take up proper subject combination.
- However during BBA(H), BCA(H) admission the faculty members counsel the students and gives them a brief overview of the entire syllabus, so that they may have some prior knowledge of the subjects before commencement of the class.
- 2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?
 - There is regular interaction between the teachers and the taughts in every departments, and this helps the teacher sort out the problems of the weaker students.
 - Tutorial classes to be taken are included in the master time table of departments, where faculties devote time to the slow learners and help him cope up with the syllabus.
- 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?
 - <u>Gender</u> Students disciplines anti ragging cell, Gender sensitization and sexual harassment cell try to sensitize the students and staffs regarding such issues. Seminars are also organized on these sensitive issues. Zero tolerance of Eveteasing is adopted.



- <u>Inclusive Representation</u> The institution is an inclusive one where there is no discrimination made on the basis of religion, caste, geed ethnicity, region, language, social status etc.
- <u>Environment</u> The institution is fully aware of its responsibility to protect and preserve the environment.
 - NSS organizes tree plantation programme to keep the ambience clean and green and steps are taken for making the college premises plastic free zone.
 - __ Medicinal Garden is also mainfaimed by the college.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

- The college has well equipped laboratory facilities in science subjects.
- There is a well stocked library with 13670 texts and 765 reference and also and advanced level books, magazines.
- Some department has a supporting seminar library for average and also advanced learners.
- Teachers provide advanced study materials to the learners as and when required.
- The toppers from each department are rewarded for encouraging and motivating them for making further improvement in their academic performances.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

- The academic performance of the students is best manifested in the examination results.
- Class tests and Unit tests are analysed regularly and remedial measures are taken.
- The data enables the teachers of the Institution to advise and guide the students who are weak and unable to cope up with the academic standard.
- The students who feel contained todrop out due to pecuniary conditions the same are brought to the notice of the Principal for financial aids. The Principal provides necessary financial assistance.
- Lectures are delivered both in English and Bengali so as to enable students with vernacular medium background face no problem in the teaching-learning process.
- As the medium of instruction in professional courses is English, notes in simple, lucid language are provided to those students coming from vernacular medium.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

- 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)
 - The college publishes the academic calender every year and it is circulated every year among the teaching staff and the students.
 - The modules of the syllabus are prepared at the beginning of each academic session.
 - The students' progress is evaluated by means of class tests, Unit tests, Test Examinations. Students who score poor marks are advised to improve on their performances. Guardians are made aware of the short comings of their wards.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching -learning process?

- IQAC cell emphasizes the regular upgradation of the college website.
- LCD projectors and different softwares are being used by some Departments to enhance quality education as per the suggestion of IQAC.
- Internal facility is provided to certain Department.
- Equipments and necessary books are purchased, for as per annually and periodically to meet therequirements of different departments.
- IQAC conducts meeting at regular interval with the academic sub-Committees to
 prepare the schedule of the Unit Test & Test examination and by reviewing the
 mid term progress, the cell discusses the measures to be adopted to raise the
 academic standard of the students.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

- The teachers have independent approach in the classroom teaching process and sometimes arrange interactive sessions.
- Faculties sometime take personal counseling sessions with students outside the classes.
- Group discussions, project work and debates are organized by the students.
- Learning outside in classroom includes visiting to the orphanage, rural areas (NSS), and participating in co-curricular activities.
- Students are motivated to attend youth Parliament by faculties of Pol. Science depts.
- Field work and study tours are organized by some departments.
- Usage of resources like library, internet for team prevention, and group projects are done.
- 2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?
 - The students get the opportunity of displaying their creativity in college's annual social functions.
 - Exhibition of all departments gives them an opportunity to display them critical
 thinking, where various clay models, charts, writing, maps, management skills
 are shown to the public. There is a inter departmental competition and prizes are
 announced which motivates the students to show their creativity with utmost
 interest.
 - Annual sport is organized by students' Council every year which creates enthusiasm among the students.
 - Students are encouraged to contribute articles to the department, wall magazines and also college magazine.
- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

- The College is open to e-learning.
- The college promotes research work activities through interact facilities, and by accessing of e-journal and e-books.
- Many of our faculties deliver lectures using OHP, PPT.
- The college has broadband connections, Xerox machine, fax- facility, green generator e.t.c. as supporting tools for effective teaching.
- 2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?
 - Experts' lecture, faculty exchange programmees are organized by different departments.
 - Seminars, group discussions and excursions are also conducted by the department independently.
- 2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?
 - All students of the college are given support on matters academic, personal and psycho-social.
 - The college has a disciplinary Committee whose function is as follows:-
 - __ To enforce discipline
 - __ To counsel students.
 - __ To correct and re-form wayward students.
 - Psychological support is given to students in distress or to those going through any particular problem.
 - Departments offer counsel to the students at the time of admission to properly guide them about the prospect of the courses of studies taken up by them.
- 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?
 - Continuous assessment of the students is made by every department through class tests, Unit tests etc.
 - LCD projectors, Laptops for power point presentations are used in some departments. In this way new and innovative approaches to teaching is initiated.
 - Group discussions are held and excursion trips undertaken as a part of innovative teaching process.
 - Smart rooms & smart Boards are used in some departments.

- A language laboratory is on the anvil.
- Films shows in some Departmental Exhibitions forma part of innovative learning.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

- Library provides open access facility to all students.
- Some departments have departmental seminar library.
- Teachers also provide reading material, reference books, e-books, etc.
- The library uses various ICT tools photocopiers, scanners, and printers etc to help students.
- New books & new editions are purchased by the college on requirement basis to upgrade & update the library.
- There is a library sub- Committee which looks after day to day functioning of the library.
- The library maintains open access system for the teachers.
- Students are provided with reading room to facilitate learning process.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

- There are various problems encountered by the college in completing the syllabus, for reasons stated below:-
- (1). All sanctioned posts are not filled up for unavoidable reasons. Consequently, there is a shortage of teachers in different departments.
- (2). Large number of teaching days are lost due to University Exams, College internal exams and Elections, College Annual socials etc.
- Endeavours being made to overcome these are :-
 - __ Guest faculties are appointed in departments to make up for the dearth of teachers.
 - __ Extra classes, in addition to classes in the regular class routines are taken to compensate for the classes lost.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?


The Institute monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching in different ways:-

- Through the students' feedback system.
- By college internal examination like class tests, Unit tests. Test Examinations and analysis of the same.
- The feedback received from the students of the college regarding teaching quality is communicated to the teachers by the Head of the Institution to make necessary changes for measuring the standard in teaching learning process keeping in view the needs of the students. If any teacher is found wanting, he is called by the Principal confidentially and informed of the situation. The teacher is alerted in this way, without hurting his dignity on sensibility.





The college has a spacious and well furnished Auditorium for holding conferences, seminars, workshop and cultural programmes. It has an


accommodation of 150 seats.



• Extension of the building is being done keeping is pace with the growth of the college.


- Future plan is there for having separate administrative block and building for professional studies.







The College underwent the accredition process by NAAC on March 2008. It was then accredited B grade. However, the NAAC Peer team recommended the formation of IQAC Cell of the College. The IQAC Cell was established on. It has been successful in sending the AQARs of last five years. The College has tried to make some development in all the spheres of the Institution. The following is a brief picture of quality enhancements as proposed by the NAAC Peer Team.

Regarding the academic potential of the faculties, 4 faculties have been awarded Ph.D in the last 4 years. 14 faculties are pursuing individual research for Ph.D. Quite a few number of Part-Time and Guest Faculties are NET qualified. Regarding resource sharing, Teachers of Computer Science Department take Classes in BBA (H) and B.Com. (H) Departments. Faculties of English Department take English Communication classes in BBA (H) and BCA (H) Departments. Compulsory subject like Environmental Science is taken by Teachers of various Departments.

Some of the Departments are provided with ICT enabled Teaching.

Language lab for English and a Smart room are on the make. New Courses in Hindi Sanskrit General and Honours in Physics have been opened.

Regarding research activities, 3 Faculties are engaged in UGC funded Minor Research Projects, 3 Faculties have applied for the same and one Faculty has completed one Project. Teachers have been encouraged to attend various Statelevel, National-Level and International-Level Seminars, where many Faculties have presented papers as well.

Teachers are also granted leave and Faculty development programs like Orientation Programs and Refresher Courses, Workshops etc.

The Library has been renovated and enriched by adding reference books and Journals.

Planning is going on and process have been started for Post graduate Programs in Management & Computer Applications.

With an area of 2400 sq. ft, 4 Classrooms have been newly constructed as recommended by NAAC Peer team. Separate block for Professional Courses and Administration have been planned and sanctioned.

The College have tried to comply with the recommendations of NAAC Peer team as far as practicable. But much remains to be done. The IQAC Cell is aware of the areas where the College lacks in and it would continue striving to make up the deficiencies and ensure the College as a Centre of excellence in near future.
